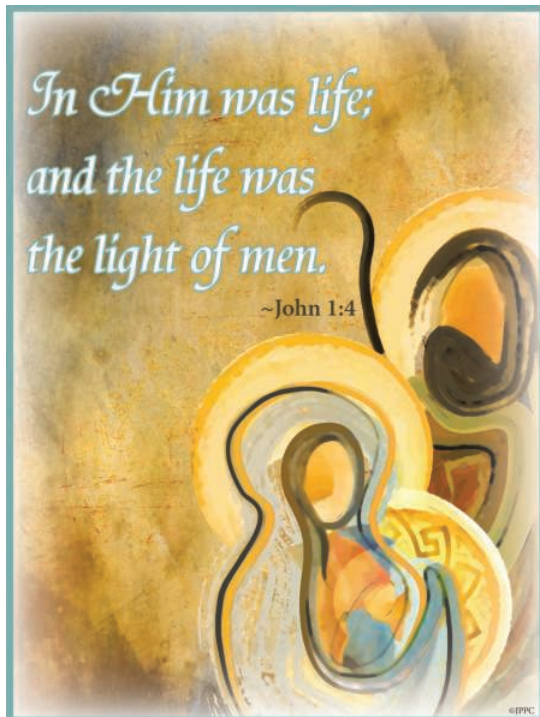

CERTIFICATES OF ELIGIBILITY

“Baptism is the source of new life in Christ and for that baptismal grace to unfold, the parent’s help is important. So too is the role of the godfather and godmother, who must be firm believers, able and ready to help the newly baptized on the road of Christian life.” CCC,1253-1255

“Candidates for the sacrament of confirmation, as for baptism, fittingly seek the spiritual help of a sponsor. To emphasize the unity of the two sacraments, it is appropriate (but not required) that the confirmation sponsor be one of the baptism godparents.” CCC 1254, 1311

Before either sacrament is celebrated, all godparents and sponsors are required to submit to St. Monica’s parish office a **Certificate of Eligibility**. This form can be obtained from the parish office of the godparent or sponsor.

To receive the form, the person must:

- ⇒ Be an active Catholic, registered and attending Mass in their Catholic parish for at least 6 months
- ⇒ Be at least 16 years of age
- ⇒ Have completed the Sacraments of Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation
- ⇒ If married, have a valid marriage within the Catholic Church
- ⇒ Parents *cannot* be their child’s sponsor or godparent

If you are asked to be a baptism godparent or confirmation sponsor and you meet all the guidelines above, please call the parish office as soon as possible to obtain your **Certificate of Eligibility**. When in doubt, call the parish office for help at: 732-928-0279



Fourth Sunday in Advent

IN THESE FINAL DAYS OF ADVENT, CONSIDER GATHERING AS A FAMILY AROUND YOUR HOME NATIVITY SCENE TO SAY A BLESSING TOGETHER.

In its present form the custom of displaying figures depicting the birth of Jesus Christ owes its origin to St. Francis of Assisi, who made the Christmas crèche or manger for Christmas Eve of 1223.

The blessing of the Christmas manger or nativity scene may take place on the Vigil of Christmas or at another suitable time.

All make the sign of the cross as the leader says:

Our help is in the name of the Lord.
R/. Who made heaven and earth.

One of those present or the leader reads a text of sacred Scripture, for example, [Luke 2:1](#) (lines 1-8) or [Isaiah 7:10](#) (lines 10-15, the birth of Emmanuel).

Reader: The Gospel of the Lord.

R/. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

The leader prays with hands joined:

God of every nation and people,
from the very beginning of creation
you have made manifest your love:
when our need for a Savior was great
you sent your Son to be born of the Virgin Mary.
To our lives he brings joy and peace,
justice, mercy, and love.

PRAY WITH SCRIPTURE, MEET GOD

The Fourth Sunday of Advent

Matthew 1:18-24

Day One: Matthew 1:18-19

Reflection question: Who do you feel drawn to more in these verses: Mary or Joseph? Why do you think that is so?

Day Two: Matthew 1:20-21

Reflection Question: What does it mean to you that Jesus came to save *you* from *your* sins?

Day Three: Matthew 1:22-23

Reflection Question: John the Baptist prepared the people to encounter Jesus. Jesus describes who they came to see. Who in your life has prepared you to encounter Jesus?

Day Four: Matthew 1:24

Reflection question: How is Jesus, Emmanuel, "God with us" with *you* today?

Day Five: Matthew 1:18-24

Reflection question: As you read the whole passage today, to which part are you drawn? As the weeks leading up to Christmas draw to a close, what is different about how you meet Jesus *now* compared to the beginning of Advent?

How to Pray Each Day

Pray:

"Lord Jesus, you who are the Son of the living God, teach me to listen to what you tell me in the holy Scriptures, and to discover your face there."—Guigo II, the Carthusian (ca. 1113-1193)

Read the day's passage once, slowly:

Take 2-3 minutes to ponder the passage. Note any phrase, word or image that stands out for you.

Read the passage a second time slowly:

Take a few minutes to ponder the passage again. Stay with the text: Why do you think the words or image stand out the first time? Is your mind drawn to another part of the text? What do you think God is trying to tell you through the text today?

Consider the Reflection Question:

Jot down any thoughts or responses you have to this question—also make note of any questions that rose from the text.

Pray

1. Take a few minutes to be still and present to God.
2. Share your thoughts, questions with God.
3. Is God "speaking" to you? Remember: it may not be a voice you hear but a nudge, a consolation or an insight. If you are keeping a journal, you may want to write these down.
4. When you feel done, say a quick prayer thanking God for this time with him.

One Christmas a church staged Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol. The role of Ebenezer Scrooge was played by a parishioner who was a gentleman of un-Scrooge-like generosity. But he managed his part with gusto, growling his way through the opening scenes, ringing out every "Bah! Humbug!" with miserly ill will. He shivered with fright and dreadful self-recognition as he encountered each of the three Christmas ghosts.

At the end of the play, the transformed and jubilant Scrooge throws open his bedroom window and bellows festively to the startled city street below, "Merry Christmas, everyone! Merry Christmas!" Scrooge then spies a street urchin passing by: "Hey you, boy, you there!" the joyful Scrooge shouts, "Come up here, boy, I've got something wonderful for you to do!" and sends the boy off to purchase the giant turkey in the poulterer's window as a surprise for the Cratchits.

That's when something unexpected happened one evening. Now, in this staging, the audience did not see the urchin. No actor appeared on stage as the boy. The audience imagined the boy Scrooge was calling to. But at this performance, when the transformed Scrooge beckoned from the window to the unseen boy, a real six-year-old boy sitting in the audience with his family rose from his seat and walked onto the stage ready to do "something wonderful."

The boy in the audience thought Scrooge was calling him. The actor playing Scrooge was caught off guard. There was now an unscripted child standing center stage. What to do? The audience held its breath. Then the person beneath the veneer of Scrooge came to the fore. Scrooge strode across the stage and cheerily embraced the waiting boy.

"Yes, indeed," he exclaimed, his voice full of blessing. "You are the one, the very one I had in mind." Then he gently led the boy back to his seat in the audience, returned to the stage and resumed the play.

When the curtain calls were held, it was, of course, this boy, the one who had felt himself personally summoned from his seat, who received, along with old Ebenezer, the audience's loudest and warmest applause.

** Christmas calls from us "something wonderful" -- the grace of God enables us to experience the same transformation as the selfish old Scrooge undergoes in the Dickens' story. May this Advent season be the beginning of our faithful response to God's call to bring the wonder, hope and peace of his Son's birth into every season and place. †*

Reflections on the Readings for the 4th Sunday in Advent—December 18, 2022

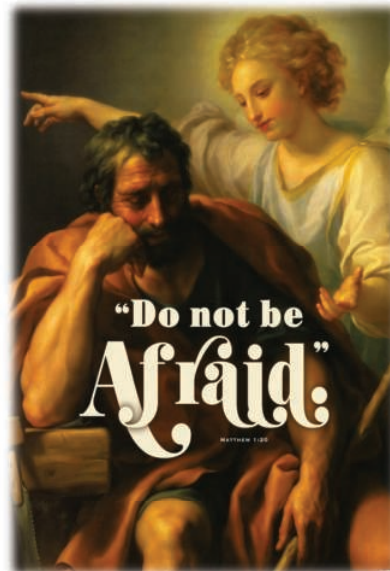
FULFILLMENT OF PROPHECY

Jesus is the fulfillment of the great prophecy of Isaiah 7:14ff, that the Messiah would come from the line of David and be born of a Virgin. In our readings this week, we first read that prophecy and then see its fulfillment in the Gospel.

While today's reading focuses on Joseph, Mary is also present. It is because of her, and her willingness to do God's will by accepting the responsibility of bearing his Son, that our sins can be forgiven. But we cannot overlook Joseph's role either. As the Gospel tells us, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded—taking Mary to be his wife and accepting his responsibility toward the child in her womb.

As we examine both Mary's and Joseph's responses to the Lord, we are shown two examples of the way that we, as Christians, are to be open to the Lord's movement in our own lives. Mary, the spotless virgin, readied a place in her body for the coming of the Messiah. We, too, can prepare a place for him in our hearts.

Joseph, the faithful husband, accepted what he did not understand and trusted that the Lord was at work. Inspired by his example, we who often can't understand what is happening to us can learn to trust more that the Lord is truly working in our lives. With only a few days left before we celebrate the coming of the Lord at Christmas, let us take this time to ask both Mary and Joseph to help us truly "prepare the way of the Lord" in our hearts, our minds, and our souls.



PRAYER:

Imagine that you are with Joseph when he awakens from his dream. He tells you that even though Mary is pregnant, he is going to marry her anyway because the child she is carrying is the long awaited Messiah, who will save his people from their sins. What do you think when you hear this? Are you shocked at his decision, or inspired by his trust in the Lord? Do you think you would have the courage to do what Joseph did? Prayerfully reflect on how you tend to respond when God invites you to do something difficult or confusing.

RESOLUTION:

Is there an area of your life right now that is bewildering or difficult for you to understand—an area in which you may be wondering, "Why is this happening? What am I to do? Where is God in all of this?" Take this situation to God in prayer. Talk to God about it. Ask him to show you what he is trying to teach you through this difficult situation, and then ask him to help you imitate Joseph's trust and obedience. | formed.org
