

NEW STUDENT REGISTRATION

Students enrolling in our program for the first time may register in person at the parish office Monday-Wednesday 9:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. If you are not yet a registered parishioner, the parish registration form is available on our website or in church. You may drop off your family registration form to the parish office. Forms for religious education registration are available only at the parish office. We ask that you please provide your child's Baptismal certificate with the form. If your child is transferring into our program, we ask that a transfer be requested from the parish where your child previously attended.



The 2024 Deacon Mike Principato Scholarship Contest

4TH WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR GRANDPARENTS & ELDERLY JULY 27 & 28, 2024


The Holy Father has selected "Do Not Cast Me Off in My Old Age" from Psalm 71 as the theme for this year. The World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly celebrates the inestimable gift that grandparents and elder-relatives, friends and neighbors are to the family, to the parish and to society in general. It has become a wonderful intergenerational opportunity for prayer, fellowship, maybe even service, at those parishes that have embraced this day on their community's calendar.

Observance of this day can be as simple or as elaborate as you'd like. The theme, "Do Not Cast Me Off in My Old Age," is reminder of the closeness and hope that young and old can mutually share. Not only are grandchildren and youth invited to be present in the lives of older people, but older people and grandparents also have a mission of evangelization, proclamation and prayer, and of encouraging young people in their faith.

Saint of the Week

Kateri Tekakwitha

1656–1680 Feast Day—July 14


Kateri Tekakwitha is revered today as the first Native American saint. Only 24 when she died, Kateri is an example of purity, prayer, and most especially endurance in faith. Born in 1656, in a Mohawk village in what is now upstate New York, she was an outsider. Her mother was an Algonquin who was catechized and baptized Roman Catholic by French missionaries in TroisRivières, east of Montreal. Her mother was captured by the Mohawks in a raid and was taken to be the wife of the Mohawk chief Kenneronkwa near present-day Auriesville, New York.

At an early age, Kateri's village suffered a severe smallpox epidemic, which killed her parents and left her scarred and her vision impaired. Her name, "Tekakwitha", means "she who bumps into things." She was adopted by her Mohawk relatives who survived the epidemic, and the survivors of the plague moved to the new village of Caughnawaga.

Like her mother, Tekakwitha sought out instruction from Catholic missionaries that led to her eventual baptism at the age of 19 and her taking the name "Kateri" after St. Catherine of Siena on Easter Sunday 1676.

Kateri faced severe obstacles from the Mohawk tribal leaders, as well as from her adopted family. On Holy Days, Kateri received no food, since she prayed rather than work in the fields. When she walked to chapel, she was cursed and pelted with stones. Nevertheless, she persevered. She refused to marry despite pressure from her tribe. According to Fr. Pierre Cholenec, a Jesuit priest who was a mentor, Kateri said, "I have deliberated enough. For a long time, my decision on what I will do has been made. I have consecrated myself entirely to Jesus, son of Mary, I have chosen Him for husband and He alone will take me for wife."

The French missionaries encouraged her to leave her hostile environment and travel to Canada to the St. Francois Xavier mission. Her uncle opposed this move, because he was suspicious of the French and feared it was a ruse to depopulate the village. Even so, Kateri prevailed and traveled the 200 miles by foot and canoe to Canada, where she lived a devout and exemplary life. Called the "Lily of the Mohawks," she is a symbol of chastity and purity as she sought to do penance to commit her life to God. When she died due to failing health, witnesses noted that her face was miraculously transformed so that all her smallpox scars disappeared. Over the years, people have asked Kateri for divine intercession when suffering from serious illnesses, and their prayers have been answered. Her legacy of healing continues. St. Kateri Tekakwitha was canonized on October 21, 2012.

Eucharistic Meditation for Peace: Trusting in Love

THE GRACE I SEEK: to recognize the love Jesus has for me so I can learn to love others

IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

Pause for a few moments, and allow yourself to become aware of Jesus' gift of himself in the Eucharist. Realize that, at this very moment, the Lord of Life is gazing upon you with great love. Allow yourself to receive his loving gaze. You are his beloved child. Rest in his loving gaze. Thank Jesus for the gift of himself in the Eucharist.

ASK FOR THE GRACE: Jesus, help me to recognize your love for me and to remain in that love..

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through this passage.

In days to come, the mount of the LORD's house shall be established as the highest mountain; it shall be raised above the hills, and peoples shall stream to it... He shall judge between many peoples and set terms for strong and distant nations; they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; One nation shall not raise the sword against another, nor shall they train for war again. (Micah 4:1, 3)

FOR REFLECTION — Our God is a God who keeps his promises. We are told in Micah that, in the future, the mount of the Lord's house will be established as the highest mountain; nations will turn instruments of war into the peaceful tools of daily life. However, it can be hard to see and trust this in a world torn by war and conflict. Do you trust in the depths of your heart that our loving God will keep this promise? Talk to Jesus about any struggles or doubts, and ask him how he wants to increase your trust in his love.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Again, allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Let the Holy Spirit speak to you in a personal way through this passage.

"As the Father loves me, so I also love you. Remain in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love. I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and your joy may be complete. This is my commandment: love one another as I love you."

(John 15:9–12)

FOR REFLECTION — In the Gospels we are given the key to true peace: love. Jesus Christ assures us that he loves us as the Father loves him—totally, completely, eternally. This love becomes the basis of our love for each other. Often our lack of love for others stems from our own belief that we are not truly loved, or even that we are not loveable. What areas of your heart feel as if they are not loved? With patience and compassion for your own wounds, gradually show these to Jesus. Ask him to reveal to you how he wants to love you precisely there. Consider journaling this dialogue.

CLOSING PRAYER — O God, merciful and strong, who crush wars and cast down the proud, be pleased to banish violence swiftly from our midst and to wipe away all tears, so that we may all truly deserve to be called your children. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen. (Collect, Mass in Time of War or Civil Disturbance)

SUNDAY MASS CONNECTION — At every Mass, Jesus offers himself to the Father for us. We can always join our own offerings with Jesus at Mass. This Sunday, offer your desire to love others as Jesus loves you, confident that individual acts of love lead to lasting and universal peace.

LOVE IN ACTION— Knowing that we are loved by Jesus and living from that place of love can truly change our lives. This love overflows into our homes, workplaces, churches, and countries—and it is contagious. Consider making one concrete, deliberate act of love each day this week. Think of those in your life whom you may struggle to love or who may need a little more love right now. Writing a note of gratitude, giving a compliment, making a surprise phone call, etc., are all great options—be creative! Ask Jesus to guide you in your discernment.

MEEK AND HUMBLE OF HEART

Heroes in many stories are usually the strongest, the smartest, or the most beautiful people who conquer evil by overpowering it in some way. Even if the heroes don't start out that way, a crucial part of the story usually consists of the hero getting stronger and preparing for battle. They know that everything is up to them.

While these stories can be inspiring, they often miss an important truth: that in order to succeed, we need to rely on God. We grow up believing that we have to be strong and be the best in order to do well. Often we bring these beliefs into our relationship with Christ.

But this is actually contrary to the Gospel. We don't have to earn God's love, and we don't have to earn his call! God calls each of us, no matter how ill-equipped or unprepared we are. He has destined us to follow him. And he mysteriously works through our weaknesses as well as our strengths to accomplish his good plan.

PRAYER

Let's return to the Gospel for this week. Put yourself into this moment when Jesus is sending out his disciples two by two. Imagine what it must have felt like to be given nothing for the journey except Jesus's authority. The Apostles would have been constantly aware of how much they depended on God for everything.

Take a word that comes to mind and reflect on what it means to you personally. For example, the phrase, "take nothing for the journey" might have stuck out to you. Ask yourself what this means in your own life. Is



the Lord encouraging you that no matter how much you have in property, skills, power, etc., he will always be with you and work through you? Call to mind the places you fear that you have too little to offer and ask the Lord to show you how he desires to work through you.

Take some time to reflect on the power of Christ's healing and step out in faith, asking him to heal you today.

RESOLUTION

To truly be able to live in our lowliness and let God be our strength, we have to form the habit of asking for forgiveness and offering it. Living with mercy is the key to this outlook on life. In a message for the World Day of Peace, Pope St. John Paul II said that, "Certainly, forgiveness does not come spontaneously or naturally to people. Forgiving from the heart can sometimes be actually heroic."

This week how can you work toward this kind of heroism? How does living a life of forgiveness (and asking for it) help us to remain lowly and humble? | formed.org

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
