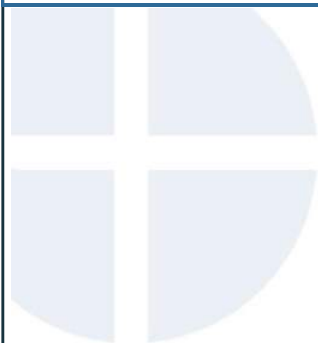

Saint Thomas Aquinas

DATES: 1225-1274
FEAST DAY: JANUARY 28

Thomas so shocked his noble Italian family when he entered the Dominicans about 1244 that his brothers imprisoned him for a year. But he would not yield, and studied under St. Albert the Great, becoming a master of theology in 1256. For the rest of his brief life, the “dumb ox,” as he was dubbed, taught, preached and wrote, producing the monumental “Summa Theologica.” His thinking became enormously influential in later centuries and he was named a Doctor of the Church in 1567.

“St Thomas Aquinas, with farsighted wisdom, succeeded in establishing a fruitful confrontation with the Arab and Hebrew thought of his time, to the point that he was considered an ever up-to-date teacher of dialogue with other cultures and religions. He knew how to present that wonderful Christian synthesis of reason and faith which today too, for the Western civilization, is a precious patrimony to draw from for an effective dialogue with the great cultural and religious traditions of the East and South of the world.”

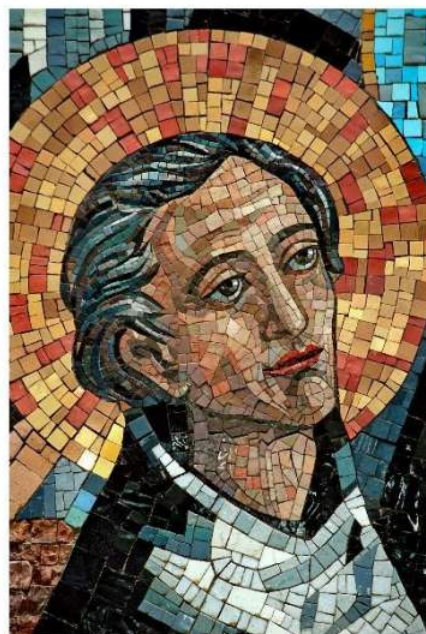

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Encountering the Word

with Jeff Cavins

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time (C)

Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10 • 1 Corinthians 12:12-30 • Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21



A New Beginning with Jesus

Jesus begins his public ministry in Luke 4, and what he does is utterly fantastic. It also calls us to follow in his footsteps and take part in his mission. A key to understanding Jesus' work is that whatever he is doing, he is going to share with us.

In today's Gospel, Jesus returns from the Jordan River, where he was baptized and received the power of the Holy Spirit. The first thing Jesus does is go to the synagogue on the Sabbath, as was his custom, in his hometown of Nazareth. This is something that he learned from the Holy Family. Inside, Jesus stands to read, and the book of the prophet Isaiah is given to him. He reads, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable of the Lord."

"Today," Jesus says, "this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." This is powerful because Jesus is reading of freedom and a new beginning. He says that the Spirit of the Lord is upon him so he can preach to the poor. That's also our responsibility. And when Jesus proclaims the "acceptable year of the Lord," he is speaking of a jubilee, where slaves are released and debts forgiven. We should follow him.

Jesus' mission is about setting the oppressed free. We are called to join him. As we participate, we need to rely on God's grace and be aware that we are empowered as God's sons and daughters.

Live the Gospel

Jeff Cavins says, "Jesus is telling us that we share in the mission to forgive and release others who have hurt us. Take time this week to pray in silence in front of the tabernacle or a crucifix and ask Jesus to reveal to you who you need to forgive. Ask for the strength to forgive them, and willingly do it. You don't need to feel it; trust that by forgiving, you are being healed from all the hurts in your past."

Reflections on the Readings for the 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time - Jan. 6, 2025

JUBILEE: A NEW BEGINNING

Who of us wouldn't like a second chance, a new beginning, especially if we have made mistakes over the course of our lives? Two of today's readings speak of new beginnings in the relationship between God and his chosen people. In the first reading, Nehemiah has just completed reconstruction of the city's defensive wall and has reorganized the priests for resumption of Temple worship. Now it is time to bring the people into the process. So, with all the people gathered together, Nehemiah and Ezra, the scribe, proclaim and explain the book of the Law to them. Because it is a new beginning after Israel's release from exile, Nehemiah and Ezra exhort the people to celebrate: "The joy of the Lord must be your strength."

Luke's Gospel is a recounting of the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. Jesus returns "in the power of the Holy Spirit" to Nazareth and stands up in the synagogue to read from a passage he selects from the prophet Isaiah. In it, Isaiah declares that the Spirit of the Lord has commissioned him to announce good news to the poor, news of release from captivity, recovery of sight for the blind, liberty to the oppressed—all in all, a year "of the Lord's favor," that is, the Old Testament celebration of what was called the Year of Jubilee. Jesus applies that passage to himself. At the start of his own ministry, he also announces a new beginning for Israel. He is the one who will release prisoners from captivity to sin, open the eyes of faith, deliver those under demonic oppression, and complete the restorations that the Jubilee Year stands for.

But it isn't just the people of Jesus' time who experience the newness. The Holy Spirit continues that work in the Body of Christ, the Church, as Paul describes in the second reading from 1 Corinthians. The Spirit's gifts are freely bestowed on the members of the Church and are exercised in a spirit of unity, so that "there may be no discord in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another." These are ministry gifts, whose function is to continue in the body the same liberating work of Jesus. Even after twenty centuries, the "year" of Jubilee is only beginning.



PRAYER

Recall Jesus' words from today's Gospel reading about coming to proclaim liberty to the captives. Prayerfully ask Jesus to show you an area of your life where you are in slavery to sin and in need of the release, healing, and relief from oppression that he offers

RESOLUTION

Recognizing our spiritual poverty—our complete dependence on God—talk to Jesus about areas where you need to be released, and ask him what you can do to seek healing during the week. Ask for his help in this area. | formed.org
