TEARDROP MINISTRY PRAYER

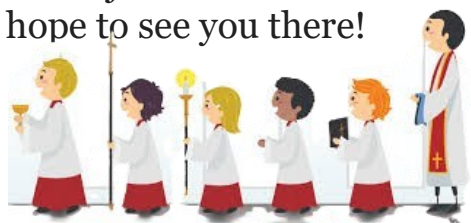

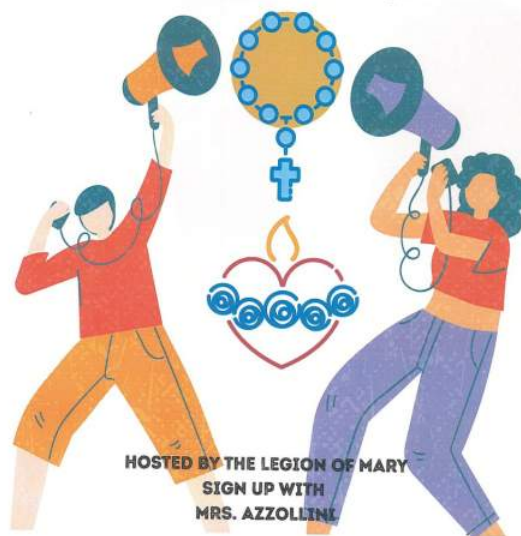

Reflection

They start forming while we are still toddlers. They continue through our teens. They grow more serious in our college years (if we go there) and they actually never completely go away. I refer to “Why?” questions.

Today’s great Feast provides the background for a serious example. Why was Jesus baptized? After all, if a major reason for our own baptism is to free us from original sin and its effects, whatever has it to do with a sinless Jesus, the only Son of God?



Jesus Himself gives us the answer when John the Baptist balks at the idea of baptizing Him. He tells John to do it “to fulfill all righteousness.” But what does that mean?

We must deal with the word for two reasons. First, there is the fact that Jesus uses it. Second, the word appears many times in the bible. Righteousness is all about God’s plan for mankind and the various helps he uses to stay the course. That course is *God’s plan and purpose*. One can see its application in the phrase that “all things are right with the world” to mean that justice and peace prevail and are both aligned with the divine will.

Of course, such discussion leads to the very personal “why?” or “why not?” questions we must ask ourselves concerning this whole project we have been given as Christians. We must live according to our baptismal promises. If you are not sure of what they are, just search the internet sometime today or in the coming week. They make for a good basis for any Christian New Year’s resolutions.

A secondary answer to the question of why Jesus was baptized, is the fact of His identification with us, in all things but sin that is. One of the beautiful comments I have read about the Baptism event is this: At our baptism, the water makes us holy. In the Lord’s case, He makes the water holy.

Once upon a time a renowned Southern Baptist preacher came upon an old man fishing. He watched and waited until the old gentleman pulled in an unusually ugly looking fish.

“What kind of fish is that ?”asked the preacher. “Dey calls it a Baptist fish.” the old man answered. “What’s a Baptist fish? asked the preacher. The old man explained: “Dey calls dem dat ‘cause dey spoils so fast after dey is taken out of de water.”

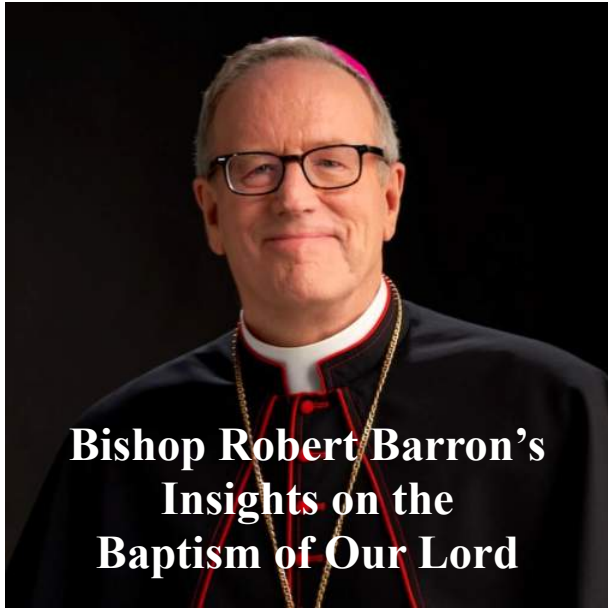

Bishop Robert Barron's Insights on the Baptism of Our Lord

Friends, in our Gospel today, John the Baptist gives witness to the role of the Holy Spirit in Jesus' baptism. Baptism is the moment when the Holy Spirit draws us out of this fallen world and into a new world. And with this in mind, we can understand the relationship between Baptism and the other sacraments. Baptism is birth in the spiritual order, the beginning of a properly spiritual life. The other sacraments represent specifications of that life.

For instance, a living thing needs to be nourished. This is the role that the Eucharist plays. But do you see why only baptized people can receive the Eucharist? If you're not alive, there is no point in feeding you.

This great feast of the Baptism of the Lord is a good time to reflect on the significance of the sacrament of Baptism. One of the earliest descriptions of Baptism in our tradition is *vitae spiritualis ianua*, which means "the

door to the spiritual life."

To grasp the full meaning of this is to understand something decisive about Christianity. For Christianity is not primarily about "becoming a good person" or "doing the right thing." Let's face it, anyone—pagan, Muslim, Jew, non-believer—can be any of those things.

To be a Christian is to be grafted onto Christ and hence drawn into the very dynamics of the inner life of God. We don't speak simply of following or imitating Jesus. We speak of becoming a member of his Mystical Body. Do you see why it is so important that we are baptized "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit"? For Baptism draws us into the relationship between the Father and the Son, which is to say, *in* the Holy Spirit. Baptism, therefore, is all about grace, our incorporation, through the power of God's love, into God's own life.

As we enter Ordinary Time, we are encouraged to be consistent in our daily prayer life, it is also a time to reflect on our Christian vocations and call to serve others. Here at St. Monica, we are in need of volunteers to support several of our ministries: OCIA Program, Grief Support Program, and Homebound Communion Service program. If you are interested in gaining more information or volunteering see Deacon John.

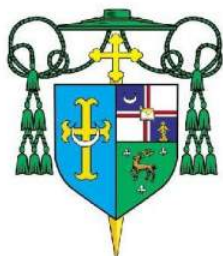

DECREE OF CONCLUSION OF THE HOLY YEAR 2025 IN THE DIOCESE OF TRENTON

On May 9, 2024, Pope Francis formally announced the opening of the Holy Year 2025 with his apostolic letter "*Spes non confudit* (Hope does not disappoint), Romans 5:5." With its theme "Pilgrims of Hope," the Holy Year 2025 officially began for the universal Church on December 24, 2024, when Pope Francis customarily opened the bronze Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica.

In the Diocese of Trenton, I formally opened the Holy Year 2025 on the weekend of December 28-29, 2024 during Masses at the Cathedral of St. Mary of the Assumption in Trenton, New Jersey (December 28, 2024) and at St. Robert Bellarmine Co-Cathedral in Freehold, New Jersey (December 29, 2024).

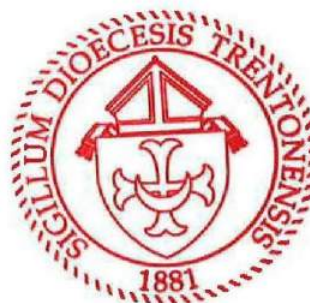
His Holiness Pope Leo XIV will officially conclude the Holy Year 2025 for the universal Church on January 6, 2026, the Solemnity of the Epiphany, customarily closing the bronze Holy Door before Mass at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.

As Bishop, I decree that the Diocese of Trenton will simultaneously conclude its observance of the Holy Year 2025 on that same date and Solemnity, thanking God for all the graces and blessings He has bestowed on the universal and local Church throughout the Holy Year 2025.

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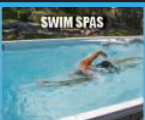
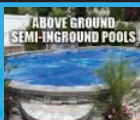
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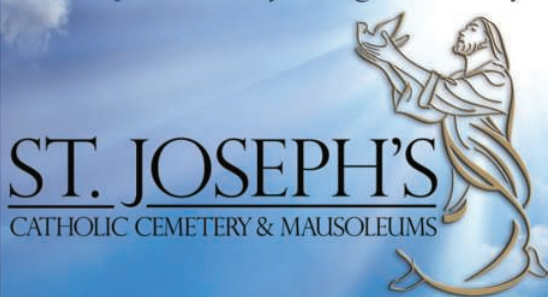
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
