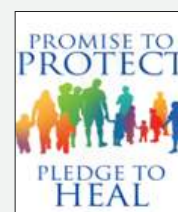

July 3: St. Thomas the Apostle – One of the twelve Apostles, often remembered for his faith and witness.

July 22: St. Mary Magdalene – A devoted follower of Jesus and the first to see the Risen Christ.

July 25: St. James the Apostle – One of the first disciples and a major figure in the early Church.

July 26: Sts. Joachim and Anne – The parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the grandparents of Jesus.

July 31: St. Ignatius of Loyola – The founder of the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) and creator of the Spiritual Exercises.

Reflection

I suppose it's a natural choice on this occasion of our 250th anniversary as a nation to focus on the famous people linked with our founding particularly in terms of their special qualities. These make not only for good observation but also for worthy imitation. So, we have, for example, George Washington's courage. Or Thomas Jefferson's eloquence. John Adam's persistence and Ben Franklin's inventiveness. You may have a different list of qualities for the same roster. But all of it would be seen as a tribute to their foresight and vision for what became the United States of America.

Yet on any Sunday morning, of high festivity or more regular celebration, we must pay decisive attention to God's holy Word in the Bible as the first half of every Mass. We call it "the Liturgy of the Word" and so it is. From it we learn various lessons on how best to imitate Christ Jesus Our Lord by focusing on qualities of His seen in their perfection. This ensemble of Readings today puts the accent on His less heralded virtue called "gentleness."



That word needs clarification, if for no other reason than the times we live in might argue that it is a waste of time and effort. Here is a good definition of it that I discovered: "Gentleness in the Bible is described as a vital characteristic that embodies humility, kindness, and patience, reflecting inner strength rather than weakness. It is often associated with Our Lord's teachings, and it is encouraged as a fundamental aspect of Christian conduct in relationships with others."

In the gospel for today we have a beautiful aspect of Our Lord's teaching on gentleness: His invitation for all those who are feeling burdened, tired, or overwhelmed, to come to Him for rest and comfort. In today's fast paced world, where stress and burnout are common, we need to hear Him. He wants us to adopt that gentleness in dealing not only with others, but also with ourselves. That's the formula for true peace. Even if we are never as famous as George, Thomas, John and Benjamin.

In the first grade, Miss Grant said that my purple tepee wasn't realistic enough, that purple was no color at all for a tent, that purple was the color of people when they died, and that my drawing wasn't good enough to hang with the others. I walked back to my seat, head bowed. With a black crayon, I brought nightfall to my purple tent in the middle of the afternoon.

In the second grade, Mrs. Henson said, "Draw anything." She didn't care what. I left my paper blank and when she came around to my desk, my heart beat like a tom-tom. She touched my head with her small hand and in a soft voice said, "The snowfall. How clean and white and beautiful!"

God love you and give you a gentle heart.

Peace be with you. Friends, what's it like to have Christ for a king? That's the question raised by all the readings for this weekend. Our first reading today is from the book of the Prophet Zechariah that Jesus read carefully and used as an interpretive key to his own ministry. The prophet is dreaming about the return of a definitive Davidic king who would restore the splendor and glory of Israel and hence bring peace to the nations. Adam was the first king presiding over a properly ordered garden and one way to read his sin was a suspension of right kingship. And ever since then, God's been looking for human beings who will rule in his name and according to his purposes. And that kingship, that new Adam, would attract the other nations so that all the world would become a rightly ordered place. But nevertheless, Israel continued to dream and to hope, for this king, this new

Adam.

So, listen to Zechariah with all that in mind. "Rejoice heartily, O daughter Zion! Shout for joy, O daughter Jerusalem! See, your king shall come to you. A just Savior is he. Now, can you sense a resonance of this in your own hearts? You watch the evening news and find it so demoralizing. You look around your own families and often see this dysfunction, can you hear in your own hearts, this resonance, this longing for the king, for somebody who would set things right, and this is Zechariah's language, a just Savior. Savior means healer, a just healer who will set things right, put an end to injustice. See, that's what's behind Zechariah's cry, behind his prophecy.

Well, how will this king come? He will come, we hear, in peace, and the sign will be, I'm quoting, he's riding on a colt, the foal of an ass. He's riding his little simple animal, because the colt here was the proper mount of an Israelite king when that king was coming in peace. See, if the king was coming in wartime, he'd be on a great steed. So what Zechariah is prophesying is someday this great king of peace will arrive.

This king will put an end to the ways of war and establish peace. That's the point. Now, with that great reading in mind, we Christians, of course, begin to see this figure who, 500 years after Zechariah, entered the holy city of David, just as Zechariah said he would. Jesus enters Jerusalem on a colt, on the foal of an ass.

Humility, maybe, but the main point is he's arriving as the peaceful king, the one who would banish the weapons of war. Jesus takes all that darkness on, he allows it to overwhelm him, to spend itself on him, and then he swallows it up in the ever greater divine mercy. The resurrection of Jesus from the dead shows his lordship over the darkness of the world. It shows that he represents a new kind of kingship.

Because this king speaks. Here's what he says, Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Who are those who labor and are burdened? Well, it's everybody in his time, all the way to our time. It becomes part and parcel of our whole way of being. What is Jesus saying to us? Come to me, all of you in that situation, and I'll give you rest. People with economic worries, physical suffering, oppression, deep injustice, one's own sinfulness, one's own spiritual dread, one's fear of death, whatever it is, come to him. And his answer is submitting to his kingship, his new way of ordering things.

See, we're meant to imagine ourselves here as beasts of burden. We go where he wants us to go. The question is meant to awaken us, is Christ commanding your life in every detail? Is he the lord of your family life? Is your family under his guidance? How about your recreational life, your professional life? Are they under the lordship of Jesus? Do your friendships serve his purpose? Are you totally given over to him under his lordship? Here's the point. When we surrender to the path of love, which he's laid out to us, when we submit ourselves to the discipline of this new world, our lives become infinitely lighter, easier, more joyful, and they begin to move according to the divine rhythm and the divine purpose. He's established a new order where the divine love is more powerful than the world. Submit to it. Get under its yoke. Move according to its rhythms and patterns. Jesus calls this conversion to the kingdom, doesn't he? This new way.

So that's the question we're left with. As the new king enters Jerusalem, imagine him entering your life. You're meant to be a holy city. The whole of you is meant to be a holy city. Christ comes in now. Will you submit to his lordship? Will you take his yoke upon you? And may God bless you.

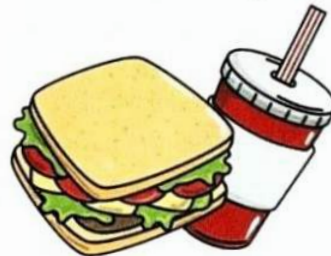

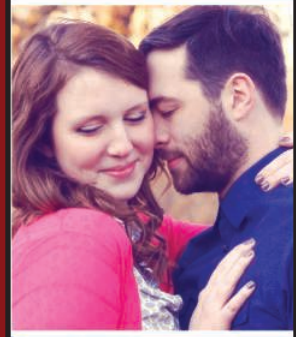
